THE GOSPEL Mark 4: 26-34 Rev. Samuelson

Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.






Transition News

Whatever it might be at the time, a two-year-old wants it now. There's no waiting. "I want it now!" To prepare for his ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness to pray and meditate. His teaching was filled with metaphors that allowed listeners to interpret and apply his words to their lives and situations. The work of the church during a time of transition is more like the model of Jesus to wait, meditate, and interpret, than the demands of the two-year -old.

First Church has begun a once in a generation opportunity to shape the future of our ministry in Columbus. The Transition Team is asking leaders and church members to metaphorically wander through the wilderness to listen for and contemplate our call for ministry in the coming years. First Church was established on a foundation to care for the community and care for each other. Whatever this will look like, we must be intentional to call spiritual leaders who advocate for mercy and justice. To do this will take time.

Our metaphorical wandering is not without a plan. Small group discussions are being held to share how each of us hears God's call for our ministry. The Transition Team has submitted its request for an intentional interim minister. This person has specialized training to support our separation from one called pastor to the beginning of the next. Qualified candidates will be vetted and interviewed, and then the best person will be hired for an interim ministry that will span 1-2 years. As we navigate this process, we continue to be the hands and feet, ears and voice, for Christ at First Church.

Remember, *The times, they are a changing....* Let's all be part of the change.
