THE HEBREW SCRIPTURE

1 Samuel 17:57-18:5, 18:10-16

Mr. Weddle

Leader: A reading from the First Book of Samuel, the seventeenth and eighteenth chapters.

On David's return from killing the Philistine, Abner took him and brought him before Saul, with the head of the Philistine in his hand. Saul said to him, "Whose son are you, young man?" And David answered, "I am the son of your servant Jesse the Bethlehemite."

When David had finished speaking to Saul, the soul of Jonathan was bound to the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. Saul took him that day and would not let him return to his father's house. Then Jonathan made a covenant with David, because he loved him as his own soul. Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that he was wearing, and gave it to David, and his armor, and even his sword and his bow and his belt. David went out and was successful wherever Saul sent him; as a result, Saul set him over the army. And all the people, even the servants of Saul, approved.

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

† Music Notes

Three of the four composers heard today are African American. George Walker and Florence Price were both trailblazing composers and performers. Walker was the first African American to win the Pulitzer Prize for Music in 1996 for Lilacs for soprano and orchestra, a setting of Walt Whitman's 1865 elegy for Pres. Abraham Lincoln, When Lilacs Last in the Dooryard Bloom'd. Florence Price was the first female African American symphonist to have her works played by major orchestras. Mark A. Miller fuses the style of 20th century French improvisors with the melody of the Johnson brothers' (James Weldon and John Rosamond) hymn to create a stirring interpretation of "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

"To Jordan came the Christ, Our Lord" is Bach's setting of Martin Luther's own hymn (text and melody, 1541), which expounds the meaning and benefits of baptism. Bach nestles the hymn melody in long notes in the tenor voice (the pedal, in this case), while the outer voices evoke the scene of Jesus' own baptism. Commentators have likened the rapid 16th note movement in the left hand to the muddy waters of Jordan and/or the 'rushing wind' of the Holy Spirit. The two highest voices constantly criss-cross each other to symbolize the 'sign of the cross' gesture made at the rite of baptism (and at other places in worship).
