



CELEBRATING THE MINISTRY OF THE REV. Dr. TIMOTHY C. AHRENS

Past Moderator Thomas Brownfield: On November 21, 1999, First Congregational Church, Columbus, Ohio extended its call to you, Timothy Carl Ahrens, to become our Senior Minister. God called you to a ministry of peace and justice. As you listened to that call, you have strengthened the course of this congregation and enriched its legacy of social justice. For 25 years First Congregational Church has grown in wisdom and in strength, guided by your care and insight.

Moderator Dr. Gregory Halbe: We called you to be our pastor: to proclaim God's Word, to baptize new members, to confirm our youth, to officiate marriages, and to preside at our celebration of the Lord's Supper. You comforted us in times of sickness and trouble, and at the death of our loved ones.

Dr. Ahrens: I have sought to proclaim the Word of God faithfully among you. Here is the Bible that expresses this. (The Bible is given to a member of the congregation.)

All: Thanks be to God.

Dr. Ahrens: I have shared, through God's grace, in your baptisms. Here is water from the river Jordan which symbolizes God's gift of belonging in Christ. (A vessel of water is given to a member of the congregation.)

All: Thanks be to God.

Dr. Ahrens: Prayer and our prayer in song is how our relationship with God grows. Here is our hymn book. (The book is given to a member of the congregation.)

All: Thanks be to God.

Dr. Ahrens: Bread and wine are the gifts of creation and the way we receive the true body and blood of Christ. (Bread and wine are given to a member of the congregation.)

All: Amen.

Dr. Halbe: Today we mark the end of your ministry here at First Congregational Church. This is a time to look back, and a time to look forward, a time of joy, and a time of sadness. In the words of the prophet, may "you leave with joy and be led away in safety" (Is 55:12).

Dr. Ahrens: I thank First Congregational Church, its members and friends, for the love, kindness, and support shown me these last twenty-five years. I ask forgiveness for the mistakes I have made. When I was impatient, or responded harshly, or dishonored you, please forgive me. I am grateful for your encouragement, acceptance and grace. You have enriched my ministry, and you will always be in my prayers.

All: We receive your thankfulness, offer forgiveness, and accept that your time with us is ending. Each of us is flawed and graced. We ask your forgiveness for our mistakes. We express our gratitude for your ministry among us. We give thanks for the ways that God has blessed you and the ways you have shared your blessings with us. Your influence on our faith and ministries will not leave us at your departure.

Dr. Ahrens: I forgive you and accept your gratitude, trusting that our time together and our parting are pleasing to God.

Dr. Halbe (to those gathered): Do you, the members and friends of First Congregational Church release Rev. Dr. Timothy Ahrens from his duties as Senior Minister?

All: We do, with the help of God.

Moderator-Elect Rev. Sarah Reed (to those gathered): Do you offer your encouragement for his ministry as it unfolds in new ways?

All: We do, with the help of God.

Rev. Reed: Rev. Ahrens, do you release First Congregational Church from seeking your counsel or support, or depending on you in any way?

Dr. Ahrens: I do, with the help of God. I have been challenged and blessed by ministry at First Congregational Church. I now separate from this ministry and take my leave from being your pastor. For the entirety of the interim, plus one year after the call of a new settled pastor, I will not lead or participate in the programs and ministries of First Church, until or unless invited by Council and the pastor.

Dr. Halbe: Do you offer your encouragement for the continued ministry of First Church and for the relationship with others who will come to serve?

Dr. Ahrens: I do, with the help of God.

Past Association and Conference Moderator Robert Kutschbach: On behalf of the Central Southeast Association of the United Church of Christ, I witness to the words spoken: words of thankfulness, forgiveness, and release.

Dr. Ahrens: I thank the United Church of Christ for the love and support shown me in my ministry. I

ask forgiveness for my transgressions. I am thankful that the United Church of Christ has been a place for me to serve God and grow as a voice for the social gospel.

Mr. Kutschbach: On behalf of the Association, I receive your gratitude and offer forgiveness. I ask your forgiveness for hurts caused by the Association. With First Congregational Church, we share our gratitude for your ministry. The member churches of our Association and Conference hold each of you in prayer. We pledge our support in the transitions signified in this service.

Dr. Ahrens: I forgive the Association and accept its gratitude.

Dr. Halbe: Thanks be to God. Let us pray.

All: God, whose everlasting love for all is trustworthy, help each of us to trust the future which rests in your care. The time we were together in your name saw our laughter and tears, our hopes and disappointments. We give thanks for these twenty-five years together. Guide us as we hold these cherished memories, ready to move in new directions, until that time when we are completely one with you and with each other, in the name of Jesus Christ we pray. Amen.

First Stories Interviews with The Rev. Dr. Tim Ahrens

Today, the Heritage Committee is pleased to present the second of two interviews with the Rev. Dr. Timothy Ahrens, shared through First Stories, as he nears the conclusion of nearly 25 years of ministry at First Congregational Church.

Join journalist and First Church member Nancy Gilson Braverman as she hosts a reflection by Dr. Ahrens on the rich history and beauty of our sanctuary, including:

- How our sacred space fosters deeper connections with God, the clergy, and fellow worshippers.
- The meticulous restoration of the one-million-piece Jeffrey stained-glass window above the Chancel.
- The stories behind the Friendship and Gladden Windows in the East and West Transepts, and the Rose Window, now partially obscured by the Beckerath Organ.
- The gift of 16th-century Belgian tapestries, donated by member Frederick Schumacher in the late 1930s.
- The addition of the Clerestory and Aisle windows in the 1980s and their Biblical symbolism.
- The restoration of the Kimball Organ, made possible by a bequest from Jean MacNevin.
- The Veterans Memorial in the southwest corner of the nave, completed as part of Adam Wade's Eagle Scout project.
- Our newest stained-glass windows: the Music Window, honoring G. Dene Barnard, and the Social Justice Window.

We are honored to share this final interview with Tim and hope you find it both meaningful and enjoyable.


